Kitty Military Might

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Our cats lead a peaceful existence compared to their ancestors who have survived against all odds in many war-torn countries even today. Cats are often overlooked in the history of military animals, but they did contribute. Most of our famous wartime cats became famous during World War I and II, when cats were still very much a part of the naval service but they have

been serving in the military as far back as the second century. Cats were extremely useful in controlling the rat populations, which would devour and contaminate the soldier's food supply.

Wartime - 2nd Century

The Egyptians revered cats, some even worshipping them as Gods. What's the possibility

A word from our President

Spring has finally arrived after a rather chilly winter. We have several fundraising events planned, so please read about them in this newsletter and save the dates.

With Spring arriving the cat population blossoms like the flowers. Of course, as you know, the answer is prevention through spaying and neutering. We issue 80-90 spay/neuter vouchers per month to help with this problem. In addition to the \$20 that people pay us to purchase a voucher, in 2018 StreetCats paid about \$18,000 more to the veterinary clinics for the spay/neuter/vaccinate work performed with these vouchers. This reduces the number of unwanted kittens being born and keeps adults healthier with the rabies vaccinations. With your generous donations we are able to keep this program running.

We have been in operation 22 years and thanks to all our wonderful, dedicated volunteers and donors we will be in operation for at least 22 more. Thank you again.

Crimean Tom - 1854

A large orange tabby named Crimean Tom, was an accidental war hero. In 1854, when British and French troops occupied the Russian port town of Sevastopol, Tom led the famished troops to stored food beneath the rubble. The food had been hidden all along the waterfront by the Russian defenders. Though he was never an official military cat, Tom was adopted as a mascot by the grateful soldiers and was taken along to England when the troops returned home.

Tiddles - 1940's

Tiddles, a black British short hair, was born and raised as a ship cat. While he served on a few Royal Navy aircraft carriers, his main commission was on the HMS Victorious in the early 1940s. He served as the official Captain's Cat. It can be assumed that he performed his duties admirably, since he traveled over 30,000 miles during his naval service. He may also be one of the reasons why the black cat is considered lucky in Great Britain.

Faith, the Faithful Church Cat

One of the more well-known cat stories is that of Faith, a cat who made her home in 1936 at Saint Augustine's Church in London. On September 6, 1940, she apparently had a funny feeling and moved her recently born kitten from the warm upper floors to the basement — just a day before London was hit by German air bombs. She and her kitten, Panda, were rescued from beneath the rubble by Father Henry Ross, and she was later awarded a special medal for bravery for "steadfast courage in the Battle of London."

Able Seacat Simon

Able Seacat Simon (his official title), of the Royal Navy's HMS Amethyst, began his career in 1948 as the Amethyst's formal "ratter." During the time he served, Simon performed his duties so well that he was twice awarded in 1949. After a grueling incident with Chinese forces Simon was awarded an Amethyst campaign ribbon for his valiant service. Then he received the Dickin Medal for animal gallantry. Simon is the only cat to have received the Dickin Medal and when he died, he was buried with full naval honors.

PFC Hammer

Even today a good mouser is still cherished. PFC Hammer proved his worth in 2004 when he decided to move in with the troops of a U.S. Army unit in Iraq. He killed and chased away mice that would have eaten or contaminated the soldiers' food stores. The men were so grateful for Hammer's hard work and affection toward them that they made him an honorary member of their unit, and applied for and received help from Alley Cat Allies and Military Mascots to bring Hammer home to America after their deployment. He moved to Colorado with his old staff sergeant.



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Warm and Fuzzy Stories

Stallone, a striking red bullseye tabby, and **Pearl**, a beautiful Blue, were adopted together by Amy and Chris Layton. Amy says that the kitties are good friends and that they have gotten a little chubbier since settling into their new home. It took Pearl

a little longer than Stallone to get used to her new home and to come out of her shell. She is now completely adjusted. Stallone and Pearl love to play together and chase each other all the time. 

Intaking new kitties into our program

We often have people ask where we get our cats and what our process is to bring them in to StreetCats. Our cats come to us for a variety of reasons. All circumstances are different, but some cats have owners who can no longer care for their cat, someone may be moving and can't take their cat, or the cat is a stray (we are unable to bring in feral cats) that has been abandoned on the streets and needs a new home.

To put a cat on the intake waiting list, please make up a flyer with a picture of the cat, describe the cat's behavior and what has been done medically to the cat. Also

put your name and phone number on the back. Bring the flyer into StreetCats and give it to a Lead volunteer. She will notify the intake person and a number will be as-

signed. The flyer will then be placed on the bulletin board in the merchandise area as part of our intake list. Visitors to StreetCats may also view the flyers and be interested in the cats waiting to come in. If so, we will call you and give you the name and number of the interested person and both of you can work out further arrangements. If a cat that has a flyer on our bulletin board does find a home before we can take it in, please call our message line (918-298-0104) and let us know so we can take down the flyer

and remove the kitty from our wait list. We usually have 9-12 cats in StreetCats at any given time and bring in cats aged 8 mos. to 8 yrs. based on adoptions, which creates availability to take cats into our program.

When a cat is accepted for intake, the intake volunteer will call you to make arrangements for you to take the cat to Feline Specialties (9702 Riverside Parkway), which is the veterinarian clinic we use for all our kitties. We ask for a \$40 donation (cash or check) that goes towards the expenses (in excess of \$100) we incur when we intake a cat. Feline Specialties will

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have paperwork for you to complete that gives us info about the cat so we know likes and dislikes during this transition period.

The first veterinary item is to test the cat for Feline Leukemia/FIV to ensure it tests negative and can become a StreetCat. If it tests positive, the person who brought the cat in will be contacted to determine the next step. Each cat is then spayed (females) or neutered (males) or they verify the cat has had these procedures. They do a complete exam of the cat including checking for fleas, ringworm and the cat's teeth. A dental cleaning is done if there is tarter which could be causing gum irrita-

tions. They are given a dose of both flea and worm medicine. A fecal sample is sent out to a lab to ensure it is negative for any intestinal parasites it might have acquired while outside. Rabies and upper respiratory vaccinations are given unless the cat is current for these vaccinations. The cat is also given a bath and groomed before it comes into StreetCats. If there is any reason a cat cannot come directly into Street-Cats, it will either stay at Feline Specialties or it will go to a foster home until it can come in. While cats are in foster homes they must be kept separate from all other animals in the home as we don't want them to pass anything on to other pets nor do we want those pets to pass something on to our kitties.

In most cases it only takes a couple of days before a cat is taken in at Feline Specialties and it then comes into StreetCats. Of course, the cat gets lots of attention from the volunteers once it is in our facility. We do not cage our kitties unless it is felt they really need that security for a few days; otherwise they are free to roam in our cat area and meet and greet the other kitties that we have. Some are quite eager to meet other kitties while others prefer hidey holes and to watch what is going on. Regardless, we pet them all and help them adjust to their temporary home until they get a new forever home.



Finding a Lost Cat

There are few things scarier for a pet owner than losing their beloved friend, especially when it's an indoor cat. They can slip out doors that weren't quite shut, windows with a torn screen, or perhaps just let out by a guest that wasn't aware the kitty needed to stay inside. No matter how it happens, here are tips for finding your furry baby safely.

Stay Calm

Keep a clear head and remain calm for your kitty. Keeping calm while searching will keep them calm once you find each other.

Check INDOORS

Cats are incredibly talented at tucking themselves away in strange places, making it difficult to find them. Under sheets or blankets, in hidden corners behind furniture, in closets, under ottomans or other furniture, behind curtains, etc. are all popular places for "lost" cats to be found.

Stay Close to Home

If you know your indoor kitty must be outside, remember that your kitty is just as frightened and overwhelmed as you are because it isn't used to being outside. Chances are it isn't far from home but is hiding because it is scared. Alert your surrounding neighbors and ask them if you can check their garages, sheds, under decks or porches and even in crawl spaces. Take flyers door to door to leave with your neighbors and post signs in your neighborhood. If children are outside playing ask

them to keep an eye out for your kitty.

One of the best times to look for a lost cat is at night for one simple reason – reflection! Be sure to let your neighbors know that you will be out looking so they know you are a worried pet owner and not a burglar, peeping tom, etc. Take a flashlight and start shining it in bushes and other dark places that look like safe hidey-holes for a scared kitty. As you are shining that flashlight, look for the reflection of the light in your kitty's eyes.

Leave out some food and water in a few locations. Also leaving their litter box outside has attracted cats back home. Having familiar scents around may help to draw

them out (especially at night) and the food and water will help keep them nourished and hydrated.

Connect

Make sure that you have a good photo of your pet so you can circulate that picture everywhere on your flyers, but also put it on Petfinder.com, Facebook, Instagram, NextDoor.com, Twitter, Email, etc. If your kitty is microchipped, be sure to contact the organization that has your kitty records or contact a Lost Pet group (LostMyKitty.com) who will send info out about your kitty (even if there is a fee, it will be worth it).

SUCCESS – Kitty is back home!

After you find your kitty take it to your vet to be checked out. While you can look it over there may be scratches or injuries to it that you can't see and it's important for it to get checked before abscesses or other illness occur. If your kitty isn't microchipped, consider doing that now just in case it gets out again. Be sure to give him or her extra love and attention so they know that being home is the best place for them.
