Seniors can make perfect pets

The general consensus on aging is that it sucks, for lack of a better word.

I'm on the opposite side of the table for this debate. With age comes comfort, more smarts, larger joke

animals, aging

Handsome grey

hairs make for a more distinguished face, older joints make for an enviable slow-paced attitude, skinnier days mean many more cuddles to share the warmth. There is nothing I love more than a senior pet.

Here's the deal, the down low, if you will. Despite what a quick word association game with "senior" would have you to believe, it doesn't mean you have one paw out the door.

Cats are generally considered seniors at 7 years of age regardless of breed, but they are not necessarily geriatric. For dogs, the senior designation refers to the last 25% of their life span,

which varies by breed.

In the animal world, senior means you've learned how to make humans love you. It means you cherish those back scratches more than ever before. It means a human's love for you makes your world go round. Senior pets are golden companions.

A few things to consider when adopting a senior pet:

1. Time

Seniors may need a little extra TLC than younger pets due to medical attention, dietary restrictions and necessary heart-

Spotlight on Sheila Chenoweth

I grew up with pets — mostly cats — and, as long as I can remember, I have always been "over the top" about all animals. If it's got fur, I love it.

I was volunteering at a shelter in South New Jersey and serving on their Board of Directors when I got transferred in 1973 following the wake of the oil industry boom to Tulsa.

I started volunteering with Animal Aid in the evenings, rescuing injured animals. Several months later, I added Saturday volunteering with the Tulsa SPCA (back when they used empty wine kegs as dog houses!)

By early 1975, while still volunteering at the shelter, I had graduated to the SPCA's Board of Directors. And then I met my future husband, Ben Chenoweth, the following May when he joined the research lab (my department) at Cities Service. We were married a

year later. Two weeks after our marriage, we were transferred to Houston, Texas, where we lived for the next 20+ years.

Ben and I immediately got involved with Citizens for Animal Protection (CAP), a group of dedicated animal rescue folks in West Houston desperately working toward opening a shelter.

For the next two years, we were all fostering our rescues until we got the resources to open the first CAP shelter.

It was a small facility in a strip center, but we had a fantastic adoption rate. We took in cats, dogs, ferrets, rabbits—whatever needed a home.

Vet bills for spay/neuters and

shots, etc. were off the wall, but we had nonstop fund raisers to meet the challenge.

For a donation, CAP provided volunteers to staff just about any event in town that would let us set up an information booth. The Annual Arabian Horse Show was our big money-maker.

I soon became volunteer coordinator and then joined the Board of Directors two years later. By then, CAP was operating two strip-center shelters.

In 2012, Citizens for Animal Protection realized their dream and opened a multi-million dollar, state of the art, animal shelter in West Houston on Interstate 10 — fully accredited by the Humane Society of the United States and considered one of the best shelters in the United States.

I missed the CAP shelter grand opening since the oil industry had moved us back to Tulsa when Ben accepted a job with Williams in late 1997.

Still rescuing and finding homes for strays on my own, a few years later, I met Vicky Isaacs, who helped me trap kittens living in the shrubbery near the J.C. Penney catalog entrance at Woodland Hills Mall.

She led me to StreetCats, and the rest is history. I've been volunteering at the shelter every Wednesday afternoon, starting at the Farm Shopping Center, since October of 2001.

I've been blessed to meet some of the most caring and compassionate people in the world and consider them friends.

About two years ago, Ben and I started seriously considering retirement.

Late last year, we decided to settle in Florida, just south of Tampa, since we have family already living in the area (as well as my BFF since the fourth grade!) Plus there's a "no-kill" animal shelter 15 minutes away from our future neighborhood and a horse rescue ranch not much further out. My animal volunteering will continue.

We are now scheduled to close on our home in June, and I will miss StreetCats kitties, volunteers and the StreetCat visitors very much.

EDITORS' NOTE: The volunteers and cats of our organization and of numerous others in Tulsa will miss the generosity and love that the Chenoweths have shared with so many of us in their years here in our city. They will truly be missed by all.

warming snuggles. Are you able to meet those needs?

2. Current Critters

Some seniors (and young pets!) may prefer to be in a household without other animals. The organization you are adopting from should have a good grasp on whether or not your senior will do well in a home with other animals. Also, flip it. Think about your current herd. Will they be ok with another animal in their territory?

You know your pets best, so you know whether or not they'd accept another member. It's also important to slowly introduce your new fuzzy family member slowly to the others. Give everyone time to adjust!

You may end up being surprised that your new friend brings new life to your household in ways you didn't expect.

3. Kids

Naturally, some seniors are a little more slow paced than they were in their younger years. A household with active kiddos may not be the most ideal situation for an older pet. Again, the

organization you're adopting from should be able to tell you whether or not a home with children is right for that animal.

4. Emotions

Bringing an older pet into your home can easily be one of the most rewarding things you'll ever do. It may also be very emotional. With any aged pet, you never know when they may leave this world, but naturally, senior pets may be a bit closer to this than others. Can you commit to the rest of their life, no matter how long or short it may be?

5. Money

Some senior animals may re-

quire a bit more medical attention than their younger friends or may require special foods and pills.

Will you be able to budget these necessities for your new fuzzy family member? If there is a pet you are interested in adopting that requires some extras, you can speak with your vet about costs and options for maintaining a healthy life for your new friend.

Thinking about adopting? Think about a senior pet. You will forever be their hero.

It is imperative to keep a clean environment in our facility so that our cats are healthy when they are adopted.

We assure that all cats have tested negative for Feline Leukemia & FIV and have a current rabies and FVRCP vaccination. We also make sure all the cats are free from any internal or external parasites.

Our incredibly important program, "A Stitch in Time," for spaying/neutering and vaccinating felines on the streets, is something we are very proud of.

It has grown so that we issue 80 or more vouchers each month and still have a waiting list for future vouchers at least a month and a half ahead.

And a special thanks to all the veterinary clinics who help us with our programs.

With your help, we will continue helping the kitties in our community for many years.



Make special treats for your special kitties

Chicken and Herb Bites

Heat oven to 350°.

In bowl, mix 2 c. chicken, 1 c. shredded cheddar cheese.

2tbsp. soft margarine, & 3/4 c. chicken broth. Add 3 c. flour and 1 tbsp. each parsley & catnip.

Knead dough into ball (add a touch more broth, if needed). Roll dough 1/4 inch thick. Cut into tiny bite-sized pieces.

Coat with 1/2 c. Parmesan cheese.

Put on foil-lined baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 8 minutes or until done. COOL COMPLETELY, then

Store in freezer in a Ziploc freezer bag. Remove treats as needed, thaw, and serve to cat at room temp.

Tuna Crackers

6 ounces tuna, undrained 1 cup cornmeal 1 cup flour 1/3 cup water

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Measure all of the ingredients into a bowl and mix thoroughly with your hands. Roll out to 1/4-inch

> thickness and cut into treat-sized pieces. Place on a greased cookie sheet. Bake for about 20 minutes or until golden. Let cool. Give to your cats and watch them gobble it up.

Minnie's Morsels for Mature Cats

1 can sardines, packed in olive oil 1 c. whole-grain bread crumbs 1 egg, beaten ½ teaspoon brewer's

Pour contents of sardines in a medium


yeast (optional)
