Conquering Those Pesky Fleas.

Now is an excellent time to talk about fleas. Most pet parents are horrified when they find fleas on their four-legged furry friends. Remember, if you see a few fleas, you are probably only seeing the tip of the iceberg. It's especially puzzling if the cat is an "indoor-only' pet or the dog is treated with a monthly flea-control product. Knowing the facts about fleas can help you better understand how pets can get these hardy, annoying blood-drinkers and why your veterinarian may recommend year-round flea control.

It is a myth that once fleas are removed from your pet, the flea problem is solved. Your cat may not have fleas after treatment, but the adult fleas found on pets are only 5 percent of the flea population in your pet's environment. The other 95 percent are hiding as immature stages — eggs, larvae and pupae — in the environment and still pose a risk to your pet.

The Flea Lifecycle

The flea lifecycle has four stages, and their development depends largely on humidity. Depending on the environmen-

eggs are small, white objects (slightly smaller than a grain of sand) that are laid in the pet's fur. Eggs take anywhere from two days to two weeks to develop. The eggs will fall off your cat as it moves, allowing them to be disbursed throughout the environment where your cat spends his or her time. And don't forget that you can bring them in on your shoes

tal temperature and humidity levels, the total life cycle will take anywhere from a couple weeks to many months. Optimal conditions for fleas are Larvae then emerges as the next life stage. The larvae are blind and will avoid being out in the light. In appearance, flea larvae can be up to ¼-inch long and are white (almost see-through) and legless.

- The pupae stage of the flea life cycle is the last developmental stage before the adult flea emerges. The flea is now in a cocoon protected for several days or weeks before the adult flea emerges. If environmental conditions are not right for emergence, the cocoon can protect the developing flea for months, and in some cases, years. Cocoons have a sticky outer coating that allows them to hide deep in the carpeting and not be easily removed by light vacuuming or sweeping. The cocoon also serves to protect the developing adults from chemicals.
- The adult flea will emerge when the presence of a potential host is made obvious by vibrations, rising levels of carbon dioxide, and body heat. This may be triggered by your cat walking by, or people moving in the house, alerting the flea to emerge from its cocoon to feed.

Treating Your Environment

Each lifecycle is different and that's why veterinarians recommend treating your home environment, as well as treating all pets in the home for more than one month. And depending on the severity of the problem, you may need to call an exterminator or use over-the-counter insecticides to treat your home. Ask your veterinarian for a flea-control product that kills adult fleas and keeps flea eggs and larvae from developing into adults

Now before your skin starts to crawl and you go all ninja crazy treating the cat, the yard and the house, I ask you to use caution. Many (if not all) of the commercial flea products contain chemicals. Beware the compounding danger of too many chemicals at once when you treat your pet, the house, and your yard at the same time. There are some very good commercial treatments on the market today and they get better every year. My vet just sent out the most wonderful email full of information on fleas. The choice to use natural products or commercial products on your pet is a personal one. We are not here to endorse one method over the other. Ask yourself some questions: If you are treating your home and your yard, what chemicals are you exposing your family to? What products cannot be used on cats? Many essential oils cannot be used on cats or on dogs. Just because a product works for you, does not mean it is a healthy choice for your pet. Note: Don't ever use flea products designed for other pets on your cat and ALWAYS follow the dosage chart on the back of the packet.

There are many resources on the internet, so do your homework before you start any treatment of your pet or environment, and consult with your vet on dosage of commercial or natural products. Some resources are PetwebMD.com, cat-world.com, and there are many YouTube videos on how to determine if your cat has fleas (many are provided by veterinarians).

The biggest defense against fleas is vacuuming and it involves no chemicals at all. It is recommended that you vacuum every day for a few weeks which will eliminate most of the problem. Follow this by thoroughly cleaning your home. Wash all pet bedding, small carpets, dark corners, or anywhere your pet frequents. If your cat sleeps in bed with you, then wash your bedding as well. Frequent cleaning will take perseverance but you will eventually be able to declare victory.

Last of all, I share a tale of caution: One of my very dear friends found fleas on her small dog. So, being a good pet parent she treated the house, the yard and the dog at the same time, as recommended. Soon afterward her dog began throwing-up blood. After a visit to the vet she was heartbroken to realize she had inadvertently poisoned her own dog. The amount of flea control on your pet and in their environment matters. Don't overdo.
