

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITY WITH THE **D**RILLERS

The **Tulsa Drillers** have a new stadium, and they want **StreetCats** volunteers to help sell their delicious concessions. This will involve working with other StreetCats volunteers (5-6 people) in one of the four large concession stands. Some games might be during the day, but most will be at night. You have to be at least 16 years old and very dependable to work the shifts you sign up for. Volunteers will be required to show up two hours before game time. The concession stand will close during the 7th inning, but then there will be cleanup. The entire commitment should be around five hours each game.

Elizabeth Ketrick, art instructor, and the students at **Jenks Middle School** had two fundraisers for StreetCats that provided a total donation of \$600. During home base and in their art classes, the students were able to "purchase the right" to do things like texting or listening to their iPods or buy special candy and gum. They also created and displayed posters throughout the school. We really appreciate all they did to help out our "little tigers."

INCLUDING STREETCATS IN YOUR WILL OR TRUST

StreetCats periodically gets questions concerning whether one can leave money or cats in their will or trust to our organization. Here are some responses to these questions based on some research we have done.

As for leaving cats, StreetCats cannot commit to do this, as we don't know whether we can care for your cats at the time they might be left to us. First and foremost, StreetCats has serious space limitations. Further, even if funds are left to care for the cats, costs cannot be properly estimated. Some documented numbers show that it could be as much as \$100,000 per cat, depending on medical needs.

StreetCats receives no support beyond donations, so income and capital are never consistent and cannot be depended upon in any given year.

It is, however, very important that you make arrangements for your pets upon your passing. So many end up in the city shelter and are euthanized because no one has secured a home for them in the event of the owner's death. Speak with your attorney or estate planner about the most effective way for this to be documented.

If you would like to leave funds for StreetCats from your estate, StreetCats would be most appreciative. However, we suggest that you include a contingency plan in your will or trust in the event that StreetCats is no longer in existence. It's also important that you stay in touch with StreetCats to know that it continues to be the organization you want to leave money to.

While we certainly expect StreetCats to continue helping cats in the Tulsa area like we have in the last 13 years, there are no guarantees. Since StreetCats receives no support beyond donations, income and capital are never consistent and cannot be depended upon in any given year. Thank you very much for thinking of us in your future plans, and remember that it is important to discuss estate plans with your attorney or trust officer to ensure everything is handled properly.

peach all mixed together into a very sweet girl. Holly Hope is a bit of a diva and would likely be happiest as the only cat. At the StreetCats Adoption Center, she calls the office her castle. We feel certain that she is using the computer at night, perhaps to make orders on QVC! She has been at the Adoption Center for quite a long time and is ready for a forever home. Do you have a computer?

Pretty **Libby** loves to talk. She is a grey and black tabby, striped on her back, with a white tummy. She loves to sit in your lap and be brushed. This posi-



tion puts you totally under her spell, and you may not get up until she decides that you can. She would be ideal for someone who is home a lot. Libby is declawed on her front feet. ASK THE VET: PARASITES IN CATS

Why it's a bad idea to bring in rescues without a visit to your vet first —the five-minute list:

Hookworms • Roundworms • Coccidia • Giardia • Amoeba • Sarcocystis • Toxoplasma • Trichomonas • Cytauxzoon (Theileria) • Ringworm (Microsporum canis) • Feline Leukemia Virus • Feline Immunodeficiency Virus • Mites (Sarcoptes, Noetedres, and Cheyletiella — also known as "walking dandruff") • Ticks • Fleas (Ctenocephalides felis) • Feline Infectious Peritonities (TGE-like virus) • Feline Panleukopenia Virus (Feline Parvovirus) • Feline Upper Respiratory Viral Complex (Feline Viral Rhinotracheitis, or Feline Herpes 1; Feline Calicivirus; and Feline Chlamydia)

I made up this list in about five minutes and mostly off the top of my head, so it is far from exhaustive. Nevertheless, I think it sufficient to get the point across that there are a lot of things out there for a stray cat to pass to your cats at home or, in some cases, to you as well. I'm the last person to discourage taking in stray cats and making pets out of them, as my wife and I do it all the time, but we have learned (often the hard way) that a modicum of caution is warranted along with the TLC and sympathy.

That sweet little homeless pussycat at your door, or hanging around the Dumpster at your office, may be clean as a whistle, but the odds are against it. More likely, it needs to get shed of some infestations before it is safe to bring in with you and your other pets. (I'm assuming most of us softies already have a pet or two.) Come to think of it, unless your pets have had a recent checkup, the pets at home may be carrying something that they could pass on to a new cat coming into the house, too.

There is always going to be a particle of risk, even with a thorough exam and every test known to man. One hundred percent certainty is usually only illusory, especially in medical science. On the other hand, a thorough physical exam and a few cost-effective tests can reduce the odds of danger down to the same level as that of being run down by a helicopter on your way to the office. Even without the tests, your vet can detect or rule out lots of infections and/or infestations that your eyes are just not trained to see.

The American Association of Feline Practitioners Council recommends that every cat be screened for the Leukemia virus at least once in its lifetime. A negative test with the in-office ELISA kits we now have afford virtually 100% certainty the patient is virus-free. The odds of a positive test being reliable depend on a number of other factors, but there are other tests available if confirmation is needed. It is axiomatic that a fecal examination is a very good idea, if only to rule out the garden variety of intestinal parasites that are lurking out there in our lush, temperate environment (they don't call it Green Country for nothing).

If I haven't convinced you yet, take another look at my Five-Minute List above. Whether you choose to place all of them under the rubric of "parasites" is immaterial. The point is: All these are out there, and the chances are significant that a stray cat will have encountered at least some of them. You shouldn't be discouraged about rescuing stays, but you should exercise enough caution to constitute common sense — take your rescue to a vet first!
